
A Great Encampment on the Great Lawn!

Regiment was authorized under the command of Colonel James Clinton in June 1775 for service in Canada with the objective of taking Canada from British control. Although the attempt to take Canada had failed by July 1776, the history of the Third New York Regiment lives on in the detailed accounts of the Canada campaign written by several members of the original Regiment.

Visitors to the Encampment saw members of the Regimending clothing, cleaning equipment, drilling, practicseveral activities for children to participate in, including drilling with wooden rifle replicas and receiving "payment"

This was a wonderful opportunity to learn about the history of the American Revolution and participate in the action! We hope that you were able to join us for this hands-on immersion in re-created New York State history! If you couldn't make it to this year's Encampment, we hope to provide another similar opportunity in 2018!

Summer Craft Demonstrations a Big Hit!

The Society's Education Committee made a big effort towards community outreach this year by starting a **colonial crafts demonstration program**. Nearly every Saturday throughout the summer craft demonstrations were held in our Foster Meeker Heritage Center or outside on the lawn. The crafts included **spinning**, **weaving**, **bird carving**, **natural dyes**, **wampum**, **blacksmithing**, and other arts and skills practiced locally during our colonial times. We even **used the newly-constructed bake oven and hearth complex** in the Foster-Meeker Heritage Center to demonstrate colonial cooking techniques!

The program drew a large number of folks onto our grounds and **boosted attendance at the museum**. The demonstrations that included active participation were particularly popular, with some folks returning week after week to see what was next! Although the crafts were free to all, the Society did incur costs to put on the program, some of which will be covered by a New York State grant that we anticipate receiving with the assistance of Assemblyman Fred Thiele.




Quiogue-A Lovely Place for an Historic House Tour!

On a gorgeous sunny afternoon in mid-July we had the pleasure of touring **three historic houses on Quiogue**, including the W.C. Peckham Cottage at 9 Woodbridge Lane, the Woodbridge Cottage at 17 Woodbridge Lane, and the Reed/Patton Cottage at 25 Woodbridge Lane. The house owners, Anne Moore and Ernie Hutton, Pamela and William McBride, and Tim and Marcia McBride graciously loaned us their beautiful homes for a few hours so that we could share their history and see how well-maintained and comfortable

these historic homes can be. These "cottages" were all constructed between the 1870s and 1888 and originally occupied by many of the professors and theologians who developed the summer colony on Quiogue (known at one time as "Priestville"). Because these homes have been maintained in a manner that retained much of their original building fabric while making updates to meet more modern needs, this area of Quiogue still looks much as it did in the late 1800s. As a Society dedicated to historic preservation, we sincerely appreciate the efforts of these homeowners!

After the tour, participants were treated to a **lovely cocktail party** on the lawn at the Hutton's home. We enjoyed a generous buffet, raw bar, and cocktails, while the strains of Jim Badzik at the keyboard wafted through. Altogether a perfect
